Thank you, Alice. Thank you to everyone joining us as you just heard. This is DeeAnne McCallin.

And I'm pleased to welcome you to today's installment of our data exchange framework information is Power Webinar series.

For those of you who are joining for the first time, the information is power series, does a set of informational webinars that CDII hosts to discuss California's data exchange framework, which you'll hear throughout this hour referred to as DXF.

It's data sharing agreement, which our acronym is DSA and Policies and Procedures PMPs and the programs we are developing to support their implementation.

We still run both and triage both. We do have a number of questions come in so we try to streamline those and aggregate those together.

So we may not always answer as timely as you one, but we're seeing these questions and bringing them in and working through them and they help.

Us to inform us on some of the contents that we present to you. Are agenda for today is the vision for data exchange framework in California and you program updates about the DXF.

The qualified health information organization announcement and overviews of the program of QHIOs. And the data exchange framework, signatory grants program and update on round 3 and then the wrap up and hopefully time for QA.

For everyone either a reminder or new. Is the vision for the data exchange in Cal California once implemented across California the data exchange framework will create new connections and efficiencies between health and social service providers improving whole person care.

It is a state first ever statewide data sharing agreement that requires the secure and appropriate exchange of health and human services information to enable the providers of those services to work together and improve and in individuals health and well-being.

So that is our broad vision. And everything we do works towards that. So we'll start by briefly, covering that and then I'll be going into some of the updates on the data exchange framework.

I'll pass it over to Cindy Barrow who will share the details and then we'll come back to me with the details on the QHIO program and then we'll come back to me to cover things like that.

This particular slide shows who must sign the data sharing agreement. These are the ones that are required by statute, which is codified under health and safety code.

130290 and who are required to sign the DSA and this is the verbiage lifted directly from health and safety code 130290 which was preceded by AB 133 so general care hospitals physician organizations and medical groups skilled nursing facilities.

Health care service plans, disability insurers, Metacal managed care plans. So that's got like about 6, 7 lines of text there.

I just cut to the chase of some of the key identifying words within that, which is record number 4 there.

Then we also have clinical labs that are, termed in section 1265 of the business and professional code that are regulated by the Department of Public Health and it keeps like psychiatric hospitals.

So those are the required signatories. To sign the DSA and thereby become a participant under the data exchange framework.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:07:35

Mandatory signatories. Sign the DSA immediately if you have not. Mandatory signatories were required to execute the DSA by January, the 30 first of this year, 2,023.

So we're 10 months. Approaching 10 months out from that. We do encourage those of you who have not yet signed that where you know that your organization was listed on the previous slide or is that entity type that you should sign.

We do have a website that lists the on our, on the CDI website, we have a list of who has signed.

So if you think your organization has signed, I encourage you to go to that link that will drop in the chat today.

To find to look your organization up. If you don't find us, then I would encourage you to email us because there might be a disconnect.

Maybe there's a DSA sitting out there waiting for a signature through DocuSign or something like that.

Otherwise, you can find out some of the organizations in your medical neighborhood who you are looking forward to exchanging with.

You can find those entities by looking them up by name. It's not a perfect science, but you can do some searching.

It essentially presents like an Excel file. We do have a signing portal, so it's open.

You can go there. It's for as long as we envision this portal will be open and that's how you register to start and then you go in and then sign the DSA.

We do have information available on our website and you can contact us if you have any questions. Program updates.

So what we've been doing over the past month, so we had our last inf info as Power Webinar on October, the sixteenth. Welcome to November everybody.

It's feels like only 3 weeks, but it's probably 3 and a half or so where since then we have been covering our usual domains, governance, our next implementation advisory committee meeting will be held on November, the sixteenth.

This meeting will include updates on the signatory grants program, the QHIO program, and policies and procedures under development, which is the next topic where we have a subcommittee meeting and we'll be meeting with that subcommittee on December fifth.

So we have these web these, meetings posted on our website and the public is welcome to join and listen in and I'll still have an opportunity to have the floor for 2 min or so to submit your own public comments.

You can do that either in writing or have the floor during these meetings to get give questions or give your feedback for what we are covering on these meetings both BIAC meeting and the policy and procedure subcommittee.

We have announced both round one and round 2 grant awardees. So if you submitted an application and you're not sure and you were in round one or around 2 which ended round 2 ended September first.

And you should know by now so that those awardees are listed on our website under the grant program and round 3 is open right now.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:10:46

Also, we'll have a lot more information on that during this hour. And then the QH IOs, the qualified health information organization.

They are also known as health information exchanges. We did announce those entities that had applied and then were designated as qualified on Monday, October, the 20 third.

So presently on our website we do have a listing of those entities that were in our press release and I think Cindy will tell you and we'll tell you more than ones today that we will be updating our website

Who those are and they're included in this slide deck as well. So let's see. Grant application rounds.

So round 3 is open through December, the fifteenth. That gives you about 5 weeks until the grant round closes and this very well may be our last round so we are spending down funds that were allocated a collective of 50 million dollars was allocated in the California state budget a couple years ago already now which is why I will aiming to spend down the funds through this third round.

We had 3 million dollars with education and outrage grantees. And then the rest of the funding is being spent through the signatory grant programs.

And this is where we are in round 3. It's active and a Grants Connect portal is open for submitting your application.

So what does signing the DSA mean? Now what? So you can apply for signatory grants, which I just mentioned about the round 3.

You need to have signed the DSA in order to be eligible to apply for a grant to help you meet your responsibilities under the data sharing agreement for the exchange of information.

It's not a free for all once you sign the data sharing agreement to just exchange and that your information is going to flow out of your door every night.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:12:41

It's based upon our policies and procedures. It's based upon requests. It's based upon requirements for exchange permitted and required purposes to exchange or the whole cascade

of rules besides including addition the applicable laws that already exist and federal laws for exchange.

So you do sign the data sharing agreement and you're bound to the policies and procedures and the terms and conditions in the DSA, but there's a lot.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:13:12

Behind though that DSA agreement to make sure that the exchange is appropriate and safe. Then secure. We do have resources from the educational grantees that are available on our website.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:13:23

They're on FAQ. I think it's maybe page 10, but there's a list of the education grantees and they're public facing websites that have a bunch of material that they have developed over this year that is really good because it's a different voice.

It's a trusted voice for a lot of you out there. If you haven't seen those resources, I encourage you to look for those.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:13:44

And then you need to be preparing to meet data exchange expectations, the requirement to exchange for many entities is January, 30 first, 2,024, just a few months out.

So if you are not familiar with the DSA and the PMPs collectively they're probably less than a hundred pages still to this date.

And there's a 20 page glossary if you're not familiar with the terms, but pretty, low level reading.

I myself am not a fast reader, but these are not documents that would scare me for putting in a month of reading time.

Understand what information you have to exchange and that you will find in the policies and procedures such as data elements to be exchanged.

And ensure that you have the technical capabilities to exchange and that's why we have a grants program that if you're if you don't have that you can apply for some funding to help assist you supplement subsidize it probably won't pay for it all for some it may others it may not to make sure you have the technical capability to be able to exchange the information assuming that it's requested of you for a

required purpose under the data sharing agreement. And enter your information in a data exchange framework participant directory.

We are still working on a policy and procedure for the participant directory but kinda old school, it's gonna be like a phone book, it will not be delivered to your front porch.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:15:15

It will be online and it will be secure. Will not give endpoints or technical information for how somebody hacks into your system, but it's going to be the method or the means by which you exchange.

Which a lot of that will probably point to a QHIO, maybe to a national network for exchange or your in-house IT and how to do it but it won't be the technical components of that.

So please keep your eyes and ears out for participant directory PNP and information coming over the next couple months on that topic.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:15:48

These are the educational grantees. This is what I mentioned is listed in our FAQ document and there are websites highly recommend you check out their resources that they have made and leverage those resources as you as you need especially if you see like for example if you're a health insurance plan I would encourage you to go look at the California Association of Health Plans resources that they have stood up over the past year.

So great resource if you don't have this slide deck today. It's in our FAQ document that is on our website.

And with that, I will pause my voice for a bit and a pass over to Cindy Barrow for her to present about the QH IOs.

Thank you, Dean. So as Dan mentioned earlier in the presentation, we, we are thrilled to announce the QHIOs a couple of weeks ago.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:16:42

This is the culmination of a process that started with the publication of the application in August. A number of organizations applied and had their applications into us by September.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:16:54

Those applications were then reviewed and culminated in this fabulous announcement on October, the 20 third of the qualified health information organizations for the data exchange framework.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:08

So as you can see from the list here, this is the, the organizations that you will come to know and love.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:14

Health gorilla, lanes. Long health, manifest medics. Orange County Partners in Health H.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:25

I. Sack Valley bed share. Sandiago Health Connect and Serving Communities HIO.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:32

So on behalf of CDI and, we're welcome these QH IOs and we are looking forward to the wonderful things that they will do to support data exchange.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:45

So it's not this is a good time to remind everybody about what is the role of a QHIO in the data exchange framework.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:17:56

So as we just, you know, shared, there's an application that had some requirements that, that these organizations have demonstrated that they that they have these capabilities and so they can help to support the data sharing that is.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:18:12

Defined by the data sharing agreement and its policies and procedures. And as you know, the data sharing agreement and the policies and procedures.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:18:23

Require that organizations share health and social services information be able to locate a patient record. You know, based on person attributes be able to organize in the HSSI enough.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:18:38

In a standard way so that recipient will understand what's what data is where make sure that that information is shared in a private and secure manner.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:18:47

It's a it's a there's a lot of how to's in terms of data exchange and for many signatories.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:18:54

These may not be capabilities they have today. They may not have the technical depth and ability to do everything they need to do to meet the data exchange.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:19:05

Frameworks requirements, and they might benefit from someone who can help them. Some intermediary who could work with their existing systems and help them.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:19:15

Self-support data exchange. These organizations, they qualified health information organizations I just listed for you, have, you know, been identified as ones that meet certain requirements that will make it easy or he can the easier for folks to meet their data exchange requirements.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:19:37

And so you as an organization might find this is helpful. Is it a requirement that you use a qualified health information organization?

[Cynthia Bero] 17:19:44

No, it is not a requirement. Some organizations may be able to do this with their own resources and technologies.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:19:52

But if you're looking for someone that is an organization that has been vetted and has the capabilities to support the data exchange framework, you may want to explore the QHIOs.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:05

So that leads to sort of the next question, which is, well, do I need a QHIO?

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:11

You know, how if I do, what do I, what do I do next? Now what? Push the next slide.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:17

Thank you. Great. So If you're a DSA signatory and you're not really sure how you will exchange health and social services information come January.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:30

30 first you might consider a QHIO. So what you might wanna do is go to the CDI.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:40

A website where these QHIOs will be listed. They'll be information to connect you to their webpages so that you can reach out to them.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:20:49

You should be prepared to answer some questions. About your current technologies. What solutions you have in place. Do you share information today?

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:00

And if so, how do you share information? What are you the most common use cases you would expect for your organization?

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:06

You know, what would you be? What would you be receiving a request for? What would you be information would you be sending out?

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:13

So just be prepared. To share all that information with a an organization like a QHIO who is looking to assist you.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:25

I also would encourage you to start doing that. Research and start reaching out now. As DN pointed out, January 30 first is just a few months away.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:37

And so this is a good time to make sure that you have your plans in place and have the resources you need to assist you identified.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:21:48

I also think if you're uncertain about what the requirements are and what the DXF is all about, there's also an opportunity for you to reach out to one of the educational initiative grantees to learn more about the DSA, more about your obligations as a signatory and the role of the QHIOs.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:22:08

So though grantees are listed on the CDI website and they are a terrific source of information to help you better understand what you need to do and how a QHIO might be able to assist you.

At the end, that is the end of our terribly exciting news.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:22:29

It is, but it's not anti-climatic in any by any stretch. A lot of this next topic of the signatory grant program will continue the dialogue about QHIOs.

[Cynthia Bero] 17:22:30

It is.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:22:43

We do have at least a small handful of questions already. In the hopper on QHIOs.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:22:51

So it might have only been 3 slides already in the hopper on QHIOs. So it might have only been 3 slides, but we're definitely covering a lot of QHIOs.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:22:58

So it might have only been 3 slides, but we're definitely covering a lot of QHIO conversation All right, so about the DSA signatory grants program, this is where we're driving through round 3 and looking to spend down these funds.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:23:06

So the purpose is that these funds used to implement a range of activities needed to achieve real-time data exchange in accordance with the DXF.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:23:17

Accordance with the DXF means per the terms and conditions of the data sharing agreement and the policies and procedures.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:23:23

The eligibility for signatory grants are organizations that have signed the DSA. So if you have signed the DSA that that kind of ties into at least one of the questions or is a certain agency eligible for grant funding?

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:23:39

Can we apply if we're contracted to do enhanced care management. Those second are almost secondary to whether you have signed the DSA.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:23:52

If you have signed the DSA, then yes, you are eligible. So eligibility is that you have signed the DSA and then within your application through some free text narrative fields which are not excessively long.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:24:05

They're not like essay responses. Is where you write demonstrating a health information technology need. And then funding amount application applicants may request between 15,000 \$100,000 depending on your organizational characteristics.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:24:22

So if you're not sure if you're like, wow, that's quite a range, our signatory grant guidance.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:24:28

Document, which is just over 40 pages. But it has a couple tables with funding amounts.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:24:34

So if you open up the 40 pages, I would do a control F find look for the word baseline or enhanced and that'll touch and take you right to the tables within that document as to what the dollar amounts are.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:24:48

But we also have information in this particular slide deck as well. So we open this round 3 on October sixteenth and it will be open until December fifteenth.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:25:01

We, next week in our weekly update, if you're not on that list, emailing list, be looking, you can send us an email to request to be added to the list, but we'll be saying yes, we're, our plans are to close round 3 on December.

The fifteenth with 30 days notice so that everybody is aware and I'm talking about it today. So that's even more than that.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:25:24

So in round one and round 2, we have awarded 8.6 million dollars to over 120 DSA signatories.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:25:35

A note for you all is that we have currently seen a significant increase in the number of applications coming in in this round 3 compared to where we were.

During round one and round 2 at the midway point. So remember to apply before it's too late.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:25:54

Let's get folks applying in so that we can work through all these applications. So round one for the technical assistance domain, we had 15 awards.

And for QHIO onboarding awards and hopefully my upcoming slides will give you some details on what these 2 domains are.

And then, \$812,000 for the technical assistance or TA and 635.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:26:21

Back in round one on QHIO and that was long before we knew who these organizations were. So kudos to the early adopters of applying for a QHIO onboarding.

In round 2, the early adopters of applying for QHIO onboarding. In round 2, the number of applicants for QHIO awards had a pretty significant uptick where we had 66 TA and 39 QHIO onboarding awards and the dollar amounts were 4.2 million dollars for the TA and 2.7 almost 2.8 million dollars for the

QHI. So we do have the list of awardees on our website. You're welcome to navigate to that and check.

To see if anybody in your medical neighborhood has been awarded. These are the 2 domains that I just briefly mentioned.

So on the left hand side in the blue is a qualified health information organization onboarding grant or a technical assistance grant.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:27:17

So on the blue side the QHIO onboarding is an assisted pathway for those of you who are looking to onboard to a QHIO.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:27:26

You're not required as Cindy said to join a QHIO but if you do that this is an opportunity to help fund that onboarding with the queue.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:27:37

The applications are actually completed on your behalf with the partnership between CDI and KEI, which is the California Association of Health Information Exchanges, whereas K.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:27:52

High does one on one support with you, they talk with you, they might collect, do some email exchanges with you, they talk with you, they might collect, do some email exchanges with you, but they definitely meet with you and talk with you.

And they submit an application on your behalf. That has your signature. They don't submit it without.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:28:02

To see the Als third-party administrator, the public consulting group. On your behalf. You're the applicant, you're the signer of the DSA.

And then the grantees contract with the QHIO you don't need to name them at the point of of submitting your application.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:28:21

So if you'd rather get your application in this week because you have 2 weeks scheduled off during the Thanksgiving holiday or something like that.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:28:28

You can still have K high submit on your behalf, a QHIO onboarding grant and you can leave who the actual queue is blank.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:28:38

You have time built in to be able to say like, okay, let me come back. The first 2 weeks of last 2 weeks of January or something like that and select who my queue is.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:28:49

Now there's some variables on the timing of that type of stuff. But so I. You can't get in touch or you can't decide who you would like to have as your QHIO if you're choosing to go with the QHIO, you can still submit a grant and fill that in later.

For technical assistance grants you build your own domain you do you choose you do your application there's some outcomes in our grant guidance document where you need to select at least one but you could select up to 4 the outcomes.

One of them is hiring a consultant come in to come in and improve your workflows.

[DeeAnne McCallin] 17:29:26

Like maybe you have the technical. Functionality right now like I do with my cell phone, but I don't know how to totally use it so I could spend some of my grant funds to hire an Apple genius and come in and help me do that.

And we're not to that level yet at CDIII and the data exchange framework, but that is what our goals of the participant directory are aimed to do to help vet and say who is a signatory and what.
