The Vision for Data Exchange in California

Once implemented across California, the Data Exchange Framework (DxF) will create new connections and efficiencies between health and social services providers, improving whole-person care.

The DxF is California's first-ever statewide Data Sharing Agreement (DSA) that requires the secure and appropriate exchange of health and human services information to enable providers to work together and improve an individual's health and wellbeing.

Consent Management TAC Series Objective

The objective of this meeting series is to develop recommendations for coordinating collection, sharing, and use of an individual's consent, ensuring it is applied consistently when exchanging HSSI under the DxF.



What We Heard Last Meeting

- Adolescents, foster youth, and people receiving substance use and mental health treatment require tailored consent; may not fall into the 80% of the population (they do for Medi-Cal).
- Individuals need to have a single location to manage their consent.
- DxF should undertake coordinated consent management, focused on defining rules, standards, definitions, structure, and a common data model.
- Standing up a centralized consent platform would be a significant lift, and it's unclear whether CDII or DxF has the capacity or that the state should undertake such an effort.
- Consent is tightly coupled to individual identity.
- Consider a model structured around populations, programs, people, data, and consent.
- Consent should be linked to data types, provenance, context, and initial consent when shared to ensure appropriate access and compliance; noting data segmentation can lead to challenges.
- A phased, sector-by-sector implementation approach is recommended to manage complexity and build consensus across diverse service domains.
- Need to be mindful of the administrative burden that a specific consent model might produce.



Questions for Today Incremental Design for Consent Management Model

- 1. Last meeting, we heard that consent management models benefit from an incremental design. What's the best place to start?
 - a. The DxF Consent Management Roadmap recommends first advancing use cases related to the unhoused, SUD treatment, and justice-involved populations. Are these the right priorities to develop first?
 - b. If not, what program, what people, what data, what consent?
- 2. When launching a consent management model, is it better to begin with a simpler or more complex use case?
 - a. Should the starting point be a health care use case, a social services use case, or one that involves coordination between the two?
